### Partnerships and Resource Mobilization Intern

TERMS OF REFERENCE	
Hiring Office:	Sub-regional Office for the Caribbean (SROC), Jamaica
Background:	<p>The English and Dutch speaking countries and territories within the purview of the UNFPA Sub-regional Office for the Caribbean are diverse in size, population, language, economic and social development, and geographical landscape. These 22 countries and territories are estimated to be home to 7.5 million people with the largest concentrations in Jamaica (2.9 million), Trinidad and Tobago (1.4 million), Guyana (0.8 million) and Suriname (0.6 million).</p> <p>The countries in the sub-region are mainly Small Island Developing States and the area is rich in natural resources such as bauxite, gold and natural gas, and is a global leader in the tourism industry. At the same time, the sub-region is characterized by a fragile ecosystem that is quickly devastated by natural and man-made disasters such as hurricanes and earthquakes. There are challenges of high external migration, limited economic diversification, an aging population, high youth unemployment, high levels of crime and violence, including gender-based violence, and high adolescent pregnancy rates.</p> <p>Most of the countries in the region have accumulated huge debts over the years, which challenge the countries' ability to pursue national and global sustainable development imperatives, which has been compounded by the global COVID-19 pandemic. Governments in the region have adopted strict policy measures to counter the impact of COVID-19, and to contain the spread of the virus, in the form of quarantine measures and closure of borders. These measures, however, resulted in a skyrocketing of commodity prices in the countries, a massive decrease in tourism receipts, which have been coupled with reductions in foreign direct investment, and remittances. Economists have argued that COVID-19 has the potential to reverse the gains made towards the achievement of Agenda 2030, and this becomes a major risk for the countries of the sub-region in which economies are reporting declining growth rates. While the economic conditions continue to deteriorate the financial position of the countries have worsened as many have been classified as middle to high income and are therefore no longer eligible for</p>

	global development funding from many international and regional organizations.
Purpose of Internship	The intern will assist with activities related to Partnerships and Resource Mobilization for UNFPA Caribbean
Scope of work:	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Work with Liaison Officers to conduct donor/partner intelligence research /mapping for the private sector and foundations, as well as particular individuals appropriate for UNFPA Caribbean (for visibility and financial collaboration).</li> <li>2. Identify global and regional foundations with a specific interest to UNFPA's mandate and create a database</li> <li>3. Assist with the development of donor/partner briefs for programmatic engagement with a focus on private sector across the Sub-region (Private Sector Organization of Jamaica (PSOJ), Financial Institutions, Digicel, Flow, GTT, TelSur etc.)</li> <li>4. Assist with all resource mobilization and partnerships engagements with governments, external development partners and other organizations</li> </ol>
Duration and working schedule:	Based on the UN's internship policies the hours will need to be completed over a six-week period. The internship can be extended for up to 9 months. The intern will be paid a stipend based on UN policies and guidelines. The start date for this internship is May 9, 2022.
Place where services are to be delivered:	The intern will work from home once they have a reliable internet connection. There will be an initial meeting with him/her at the UNFPA office. Additional meetings, where necessary will be held virtually. Work is to be submitted electronically
