Through a comprehensive approach, the Spotlight Initiative will focus its work on family violence through six key pillars:

- 1. Developing and implementing relevant legislation and policies
- 2. Strengthening national and sub-national institutions
- 3. Preventing violence through evidence-based programmes and campaigns
- 4. Establishing and strengthening essential services for victims and survivors
- 5. Ensuring the collection and use of prevalence and incidence data
- 6. Partnering directly with women's movements and civil society.

The Jamaican legal framework counts with the National Strategic Action Plan to Eliminate Gender-based Violence in Jamaica (NSAP-GBV) 2017 – 2027. The NSAP has as an overarching goal "to eliminate gender-based violence in Jamaica, with particular focus on violence against women and girls", and it has five interlinked strategic priority areas: Prevention; Protection; Investigation, Prosecution and Enforcement of Court Orders; Enforcement of Victim's Rights to Compensation, Reparation and Redress; and Protocols for Coordination of NSAP and Data Management Systems. This consultancy is aligned with the Activity 1.1.1.1 of Strategic Priority 5 (Protocols for Coordination of NSAP and Data Management Systems), which is "to develop standardized forms to capture reports of GBV".

The Activity 4.1.7 of the Spotlight Initiative is to "Develop and operationalize usage of standardized intake forms and client registration formats by both government and CSO service providers."

This activity will contribute to the output 4.1 of the Spotlight Initiative: "relevant government authorities and women's rights organizations at national and sub-national levels have better knowledge and capacity to deliver quality and coordinated essential services, including sexual and reproductive health services, and access to justice to women and girls survivors of violence against women and girls, including domestic violence and intimate partner violence, especially those facing multiple and intersecting forms of discrimination."

Objective(s) of activity/ies

The **specific objective** of this activity (Activity 4.1.7) is to "Develop and operationalize usage of standardized intake forms and client registration formats for survivors of gender-based violence by both government and CSO service providers of the police, justice, health and social services sectors."

Scope of work: (Description of activities or outputs)

Under the supervision of UNFPA and in close collaboration with the Bureau of Gender Affairs (BGA), Ministry of health and wellness (MoHW), Ministry of National Security (MoNS), Ministry of Justice (MoJ), the Civil Society Organization (CSO) will be responsible to:

- (i) lead the review and development of standardized intake forms and client registration formats for the CSOs and government institutions; and
- (ii) Lead a validation and consensus workshop of the updated forms and formats and their coordinated use in accordance with the ESP principles.

The specific tasks of the selected CSO will include:

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- Update standard intake forms and client registration formats of the health, police, justice and social service sector to register information about survivors of VAWG in line with WHO and ECLAC standard and a guideline for their use. For this the following is recommended:
 - Review the PAHO "Health care for women subjected to intimate partner violence or sexual violence. A clinical handbook¹", the "Essential Service Package for women and girls survivors of violence" (ESP)², and any other documents deemed relevant for the position
 - Collect and review intake forms and client registration formats, including consent forms, used in the health, police, justice, and social services sectors by government agencies and CSOs in Jamaica both when providing face to face and remote services to women and girls survivors of violence
 - Consult relevant stakeholders, including actors of all the sectors of both government (Ministry of health and wellness, Ministry of National Security, Ministry of Justice, Ministry of Culture, Gender, Entertainment, and Sports) and civil society on the efforts (successful and unsuccessful) done in the past to harmonize these documents and the obstacles faced
 - Sensitize and engage all relevant stakeholders on the importance of this harmonization since the beginning of the process to guarantee buy-in, collaboration and the sustainability of the action
 - Review internationally recognized good examples of intake forms, client registration formats and best practices, to get an idea of the contents and scope of intake forms elsewhere which can be used to improve the Jamaican forms.
 - Meet with the department of the public institutions of each sector that is responsible for these kinds of forms (policy departments and departments managing information and data) and with key stakeholders of Pillar 5 of the Spotlight Initiative that is focused on Data Availability and Capacities to agree on fundamental information to be collected and proper language to be used
 - Develop a full set of standardized intake forms (including consent form)
 and client registration formats considering the international standards
 and principles specified in this TOR, that could guarantee a better
 interagency coordination, improve the coordinated offer of services to
 guarantee to the survivors a continuum of quality care, while reducing
 the times the survivors are asked the same questions.
 - The CSOs should also prepare a proposal for a standardized, harmonized digital database that could replace paper-based forms permitting a more efficient coordinated tracking system but in the respect of the survivor centered approach, and the safety and confidentiality as key principles. This proposal should count with the cost estimation needed for the digitalization of the system.
 - Develop brief guidelines on the use of the intake forms and client registration formats in line with the Essential Services Package, with a

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special focus on the Module 5, Core Element 3.3 "Systems for the recording and reporting of data":

- Allow access to personally identifiable information (PII) only to individuals and entities with demonstrated need
- Require each agency to maintain data for monitoring and evaluation
- Keep PII data secure

The guidelines should also clearly mention and advocate for the following:

- A common understanding of gender-based violence, and violence against women and girls
- Primary goals: victim/survivor safety, offender accountability, agency accountability
- Principles to follow: a rights-based approach; advancing gender equality and women's empowerment, culturally and age appropriate and sensitive, a survivor-centered approach and 'do no harm' principle
- Staff filling out the forms/collecting the data have been appropriately trained on how to do so and on how to act according to the principles listed above
- Recommendations on the use of the data collected, how to report data and to which actors guaranteeing the survivors' safety and confidentiality and the survivor's centered approach.
- 2. Lead a validation and consensus workshop with relevant key stakeholders of government institutions and CSOs to revise and agree upon the intake forms, client registration formats, and their coordinated use, as well as on the guidelines developed. The workshop will foresee the participation of the team working on the readiness assessment. During the consensus some of the aspects to agree upon should include the following aspects.
 - Adaptation of the documents to the Jamaica context
 - Which forms/formats can be used across all relevant sectors (legal, police, health, mental health and psychosocial support, social sector, etc.) and which of them require sectoral adaptation?
 - Reporting, referral system of data and information
 - Use of data, including the practice to anonymize data used for monitoring and evaluation purposes1
 - Agree common terminology for all recording and reporting³
 - Obtain consent of victims and survivors before recording PII (an informed consent form must be included as a standard form)1
 - Protect confidentiality and privacy of victims and survivors when collecting, recording, and reporting PII¹
- Following the workshop, incorporate feedback and revisions to create the final products
- 3. Prepare a full training package, inclusive of methodology and tools to be used in the training/sensitization workshops, being the Guidelines for the use of the forms and formats in line with the "Essential Service Package for women and girls survivors of violence" (ESP) a key element. This
